

OIE Role in Study Abroad



Navigate Process

We help students understand requirements and steps throughout the process



Provide Resources

We **don't** do the work for students, but we **do** provide resources for success



STUDY ABROAD PROGRAM CONTACTS

DU Study Abroad Advisor

- General point of contact for DU processes, policies, and program information
- Does not work for the program directly, specific information may be limited
- We help navigate the process and provide resources – we don't do the work for the students

Program Advisor

- Program-specific information about housing, course registration, etc.
- Program advisors may be staff based in the U.S., or university staff based abroad



ACADEMIC PLANNING





ACADEMICS

- All programs will send official transcript to DU
- Credit needed and credit earned will depend on student's graduation requirements
- Instructions on what students need to do in the Study Abroad Handbook and website

Program Selection Considerations

- Greater independence and more ambiguity than the U.S.
- Later course registration
- Teaching styles and curriculum vary in different cultures students must meet the expectations of their program and host country
 - Examples:
 - Professors may be very blunt and direct, and not concerned about hurting a student's feelings with their feedback
 - Majority of grade may be based on one assignment, instead of numerous assignments throughout the term

- On-campus
- Offered fall, winter, & spring quarters

- Learning to Return: Moving toward an Impact for Public Good (INTZ 2503)





- Pay regular DU fees
- Use your entire DU financial package
- Cherrington Global Scholar (CGS) benefits (if eligible)
- Earn DU resident credit
- INTZ 2501 Required

Direct-enroll & exchanges

- Work with & study at the host institution
- Classes with local students
- More course options
- Support from the international student office at the institution!

- Exchanges are the best way to study abroad for a full academic year



Provider Programs

- Third-Party organizations that work with US study abroad students
- Dedicated On-site staff
- Typically offer higher level of support
- Examples:
 - AIFS: Salzburg, Austria
 - CIS: University of Newcastle, Australia
 - ISA: Prague University of Economics
 - SIT: Wildlife Conservation & Political Ecology in Tanzania







Unaffiliated
Study Abroad

- Independent Process
- Academic related needs
- Financial Considerations
 - Cannot use DU institutional aid
 - Not eligible for Cherrington Global Scholar (CGS) benefits
 - Federal aid available
- Earn transfer credit
- INTZ 2501 & 2502 required



Summer Study Abroad

- DUPP options
 - University of Nicosia
 - Lorenzo de Medici
 - CIS Japan
 - DIS in Denmark

- ISA in Sevilla, Spain
- USAC Costa Rica
- University of Oxford
- Unaffiliated Study Abroad
 - All other DUPPs or any other study abroad program
 - Independent Process
 - Financial Considerations
 - Earn Transfer Credit
- INTZ 2501 required
- Not eligible for CGS



& STUDY ABROAD HANDBOOK

- All students access information and next steps through their DU Passport application portal
- Students are expected and required to complete all DU Passport materials
- When your student is unsure of what is next, check DU Passport



- Pre-decision
 - Academic Planning, Billing & Finances, Policies, Student Responsibility, Understanding Study Abroad Information
- Post-decision
 - Apply to PROGRAM, Apply for Immigration, Health & Safety, Housing Upon Return to DU, FERPA Release, Diversity & Inclusion



FINANCES & BILLING





Billing

- DU Financial Aid will be awarded the same as other terms of on-campus study
 - Exceptions: VA benefits and Work Study awards
 - Summer term study abroad will require a separate financial aid application
- Tuition will be same amount as DU quarter tuition (I semester program = I quarter DU tuition; full academic year program = 3 quarters DU tuition)
- Housing will depend on program billing arrangements
 - Some programs will be the same cost as DU housing (double regular apartment)
 - Some programs will require students to pay for housing directly to the program

Meal Plan

- Students living with host families or in dormitories with meal plans will also be charged
 DU meal plan charge
- Cost Notification your student will be notified by email, by their OIE study abroad advisor, during spring quarter for an estimation of their DU bill

Financial Aid

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*Unaffiliated students must submit a completed consortium agreement to the Office of Financial Aid to use this type of aid. Find the form on their Documents page.

** You can only get institutional aid for terms when you pay DU tuition. You may use a housing grant for a DUPP if it is part of your financial aid award, even if you did not receive it previously because you lived off campus. If your DUPP does not include housing, your housing grant will be credited to your DU tuition bill.

*** You can use outside scholarships if you meet all conditions stipulated by the scholarship provider.

PASSHULL DEPARTURE



Cherrington Global Scholars (CGS)

Eligible students on **DUPP** receive a flight stipend and visa reimbursement.

Eligibility:

- 3.0 Cumulative DU GPA
- 90+ credits earned
- Good academic/conduct
- Additional requirements listed on OIE website



No application necessary. If all requirements are met, CGS is automatically awarded.

*CGS not available for DUPP Summer Programs

HOUSING ABROAD

- Housing may be a residence hall, an apartment, a homestay, or a hostel
- Payment of housing depends on the billing arrangement between DU and the program
 - If included, student will be billed for DU housing
 - If not included, student is responsible for paying program directly for housing











EXPECTATIONS

- Housing will be different than DU and American standards/ expectations
- Housing may be different among students in the program
- Utility cost is monitored more closely and expectation of use may be very different
- If problems arise, student should contact the on-site staff. Contacting you, to then contact DU, will slow down any resolution to the problem



IMMIGRATION



Passports

Your student should have a valid passport, with 6-month validity after the program ends

Visas

- Many programs will require a student visa. This is a government-mandated process, requiring the students to understand the process, prepare the materials, and apply themselves
- Information on the visa process will be provided by the program directly
- Every country will have a different process
 - Some may allow applications to be mailed
 - Some may require in-person appointments at the nearest consulate
- You cannot and should not do this process for your student





HEALTH & SAFETY



- OIE evaluates the on-site support of all programs
- DU's International Travel Risk Analyst monitors world events while tracking where DU student travelers are when something impacts a program location we communicate with students directly about safety precautions.
- All students are covered under a DU insurance policy which covers anything that occurs while on the program (not preventative or pre-existing conditions) https://www.du.edu/international-travel/insurance-abroad

HEALTH & SAFETY



- Call <u>DU's Travel Assistance provider</u> for assistance at +1.443.569.8601.
 You can also download their app on your smart phone. DU's membership number is I I BSGC000067.
 - Facilitates pre-departure travel consultations
 - Delivers 24/7 emergency response assistance
 - Provides emergency evacuation and repatriation coverage
 - Gives information about vaccinations, prophylaxis, and current medications
 - Supports on-going health issues (physical, mental, or emotional)
 - Delivers support for any safety and security concerns
 - Recommends doctors/hospitals near your study abroad location

HELPFUL CONSIDERATIONS

- Studying abroad is a lot of administrative work on your student support them but guide them in doing the work themselves
- Study abroad can be stressful to students, both before departure and certainly while abroad. They will call you on their bad days – be supportive but don't panic
- Planning to visit your student? Plan to do so when they have a break from classes
- When your student encounters difficulties abroad (housing, classes, etc.), have them speak with their program directly first, this is the quickest way to a solution/resolution instead of having them call you first
